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### Introduction

#### **Incivility**

- Abusive or violent act of disrespect and antagonist behavior towards others you work with
- In a professional environment, it is used to manipulate, intimidate and degrade others

#### **Multidimensional Incivility**

- Occurs in a multitude of settings in nursing
- Occurs between:
- Faculty and student
- Student to student
- Nursing preceptor to new graduate
- Among nursing colleagues


#### **Academic Incivility**

- Has gained increased interest in the nursing profession
- Faculty members and students have identified incivility to occur in the classroom and clinical settings
- Negatively impact the learning process which disseminates to adversities in the profession of nursing

## **Significance**

- 25 percent of faculty reported physical contact between students and instructor
- 50 percent of faculty reported inappropriate behaviors
- 52 percent of student nurses reported to have had experienced incivility by the nursing staff
- 37 percent of reported cases of incivility or lateral violence in the workforce were made from personal experiences
- 45 percent reported the uncivil acts negatively affected the health of the victim
- 40 percent of personal incivility experiences go unreported
- 24.1 percent of nurses reported verbal abuse by nursing colleague or manager
- 22 percent reported fellow nurses treated them with fair to poor levels of respect

## **Implications of Incivility**

- Negative impact on learning process
- Low morale
- Stress
- Fear of receiving failing grade or evaluation
- Embarrassment
- Decreased confidence
- Suboptimal patient care
- Health problems
- Anger

# **Purpose**

- 1. To enhance awareness of negative behaviors taking place in nursing education and the negative effects they have on morale, confidence and the academic environment.
- 2. To promote self-awareness of incivility and introduce tools to elicit change for improving quality of care provided.

## **Target Audience**

- Inclusive of all individuals who could potentially exhibit uncivil behaviors or be victims of these hostile acts
- Nursing students, educators, managers, leaders and nurses

## **Influences on Nursing Practice**

- Patient quality of care is at risk, patient safety is compromised and overall patient outcomes are directly affected by incivility
- Uncivil behaviors attribute to a negative work environment, decreased job satisfaction and suboptimal job performance in academic and clinical settings
- Hostile behaviors learned and enforced in the academic environment can have a negative influence on the profession of nursing

## **Promote a Culture of Civility**

- Promote self-awareness with early education on personality style and conflict resolution techniques
- Implement communication and professional skills training early in the nursing school curriculum
- Encourage role modeling behavior of collaboration, respect and professionalism to promote civility

## **Conclusion**

- It is imperative to increase awareness and implement strategies to eradicate incivility in nursing academia and promote collegiality
- Future research is needed to determine if increasing nursing students' awareness of incivility will reduce the incidence uncivil behaviors
- Increased awareness can be achieved by incorporating civility education in the nursing curriculum
- It is imperative that faculty and nursing students increase self-awareness of uncivil acts they are engaging in
- Promoting collegiality and enhancing communication are qualities necessary to prepare nursing students for effective leadership roles

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
