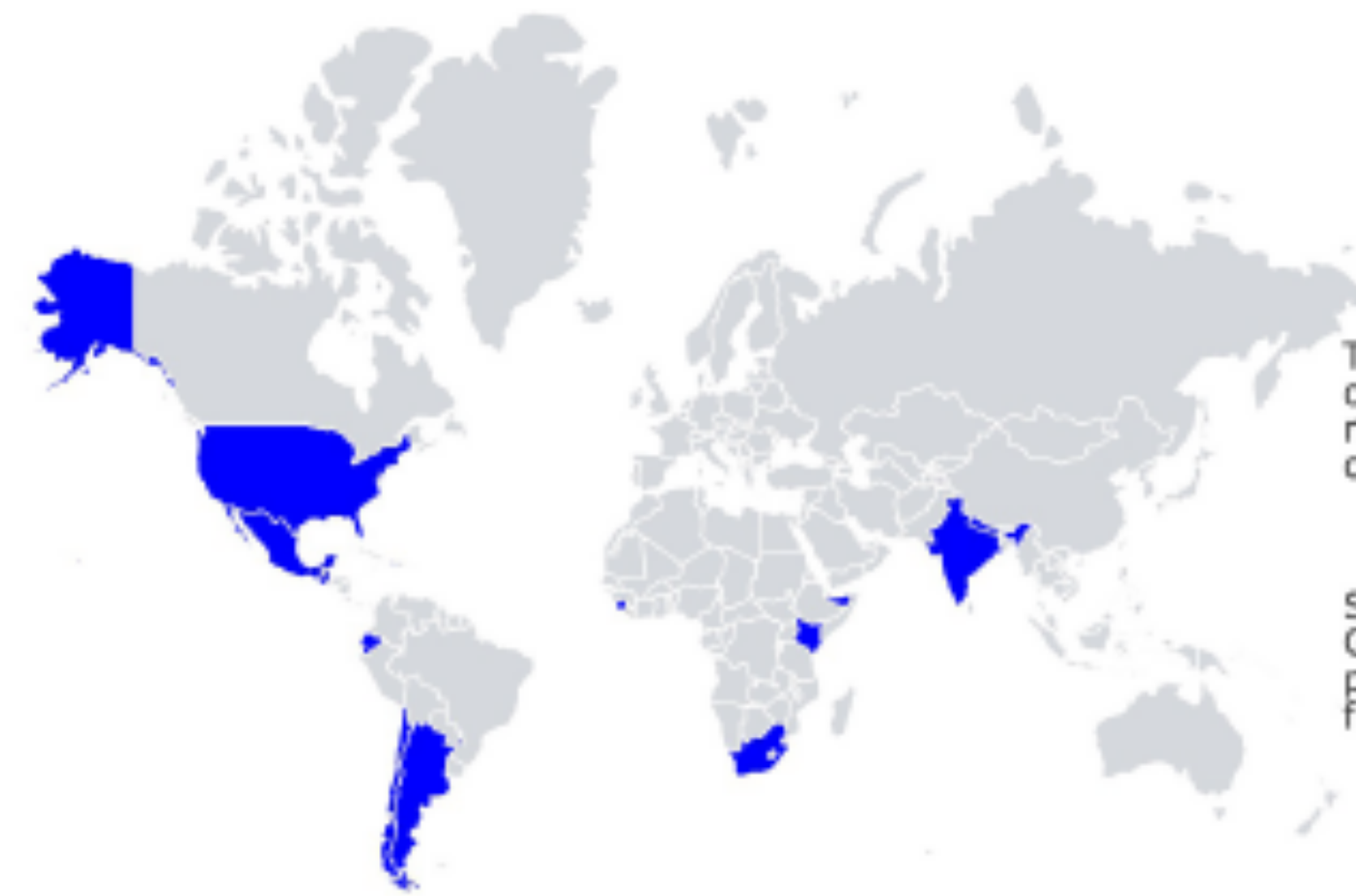
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Global Alliance for Nursing and Midwifery (GANM) and the Sustainable Development Goals

The GANM has over 3,000 members from 161 countries.

Since 2015, the GANM has published 34 blogs from 15 countries.

The GANM is a joint project sponsored by the Pan American Health Organization (PAHO) and the World Health Organization (WHO) Collaborating Center for Nursing Knowledge, Information Management & Sharing at the Johns Hopkins School of Nursing.

One section of the GANM disseminates biweekly blogs (written and video).

GANM Blogs

- In January 2016 to the present GANM is rolling out a series of blogs relating to each target of SDG 3 to engage the online community to share knowledge, expertise and practical experience.
- Blogs released through GANM's interactive knowledge gateway allow members and the public to share knowledge, experience and lessons learned from local practices; create a space for discussion with experts and individuals from different countries; ensure that clear definitions of terminology, concepts and policy directives are adopted; provide capacity building to enable the implementation of evidence-based tools, materials and strategies that can improve and scale up effective practice; and ultimately work toward meeting SDG 3.

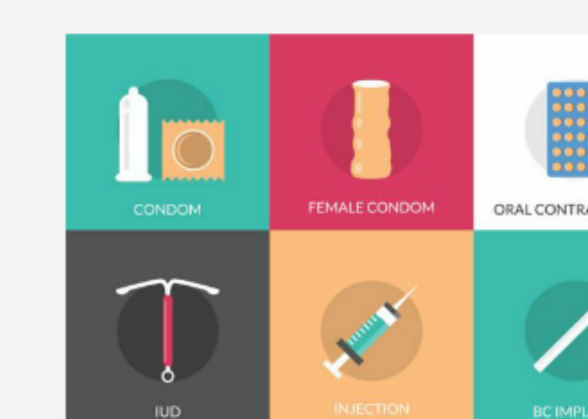
