Background

- √The American Indian/Alaska Native are the original inhabitants of North America and represent 1% of the Unites States population which just represent federally recognized tribes with a number of 567.
- √The mayor health care provider is the Indian health services with an approximately expenditure of \$2,849 per capita which is less than 60% in comparison with the national budget.
- √The phenomenon in this study is the Alzheimer's which is a progressive disease
 categorized as a cognitive impairment with characteristic such as: Aphasia, Dyspraxia
 and memory loss.
- √The biggest problem is that there is not enough up to date data related to the American Indian community. Besides, there are not sufficient efforts in studding this community because they represent a small group. Therefore, there has been little culturally-informed and targeted research representing a health disparity gap for American Indians/Alaska Natives (AI/AN) that grows in this area of inquiry.

Aims

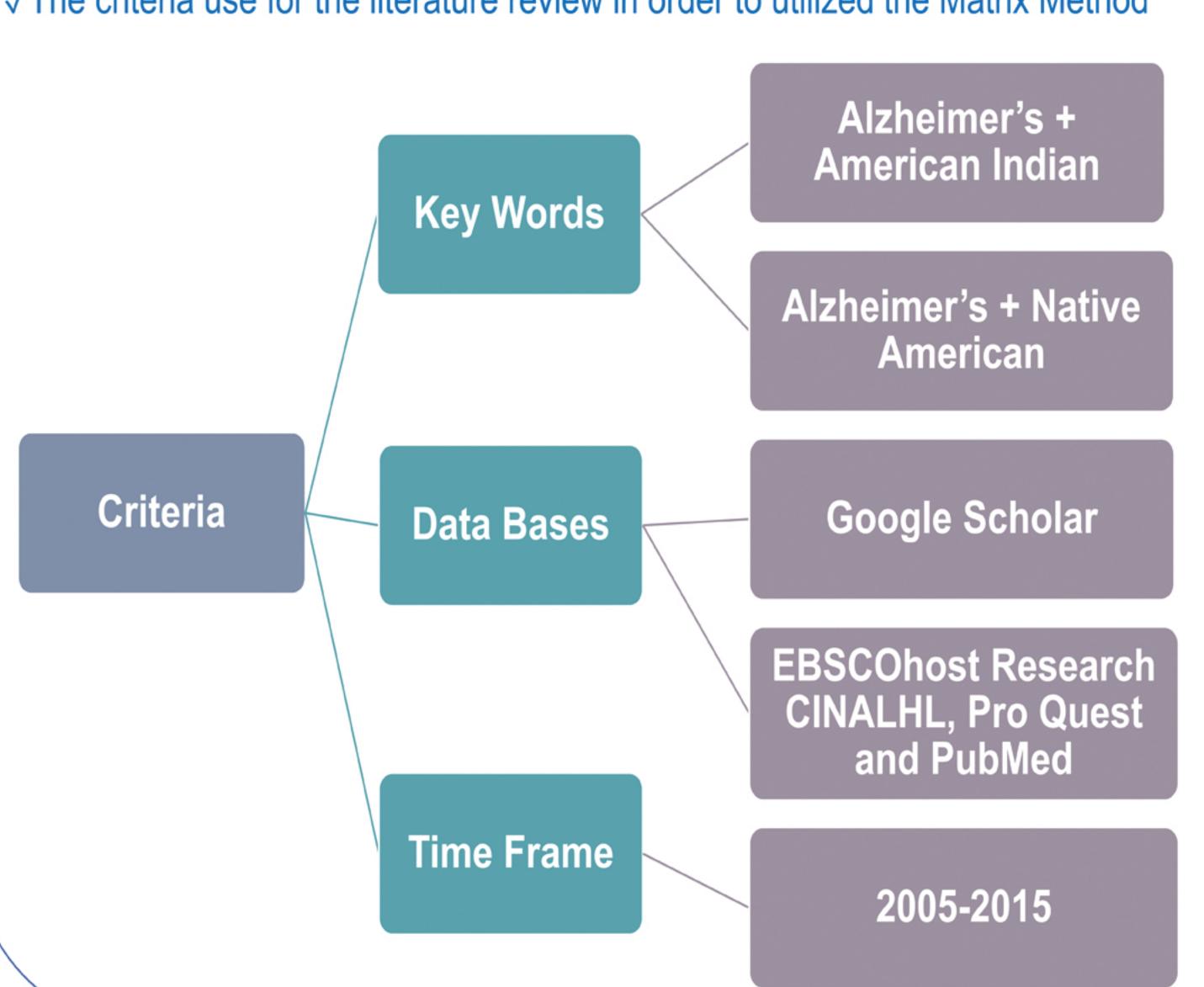
- √ To systematically review all relevant literature on American Indian/ Alaska Natives

√What are the sources of discrepancy in the use of Alzheimer's assessment tools in the American Indian Population?

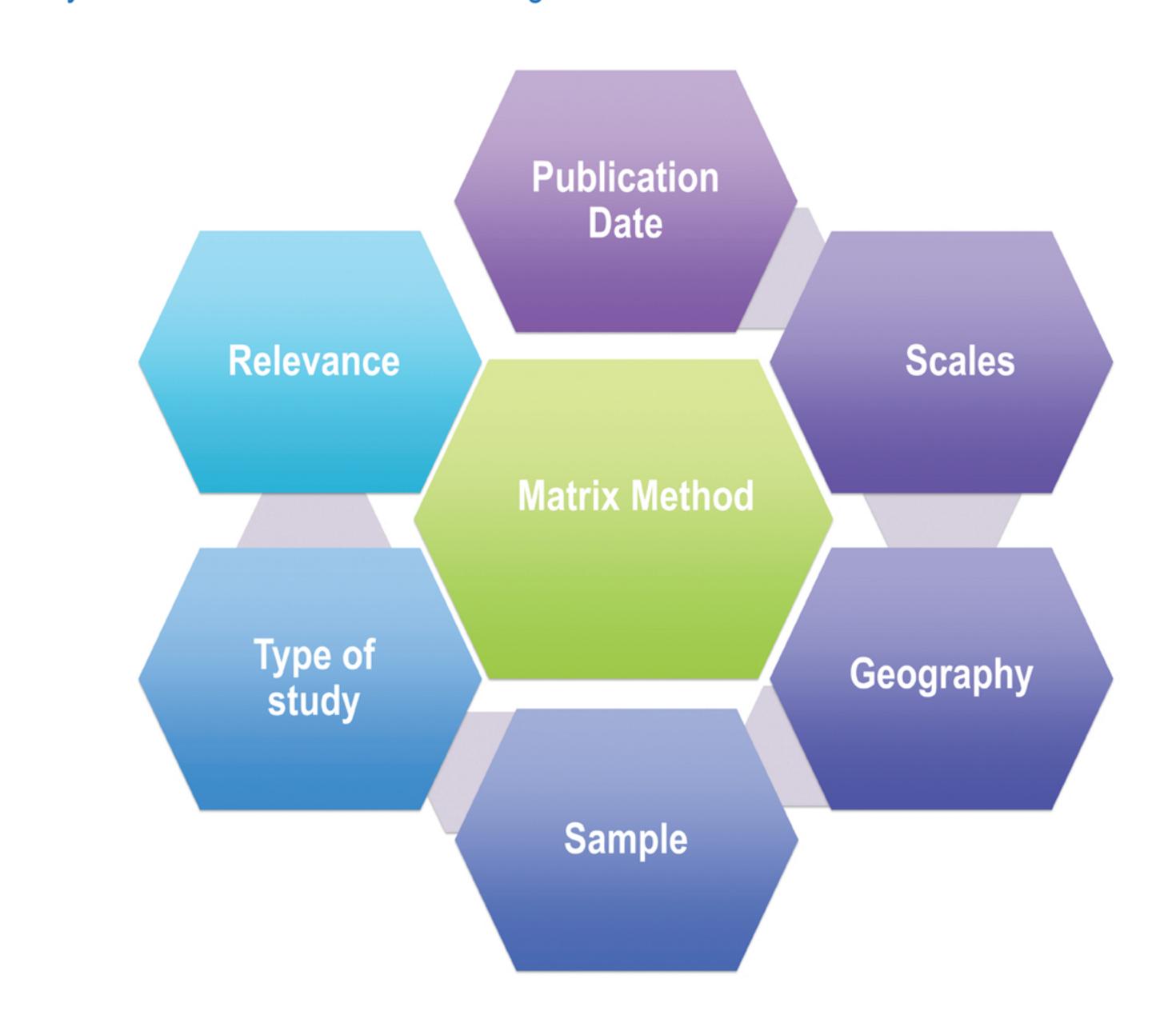
Methods

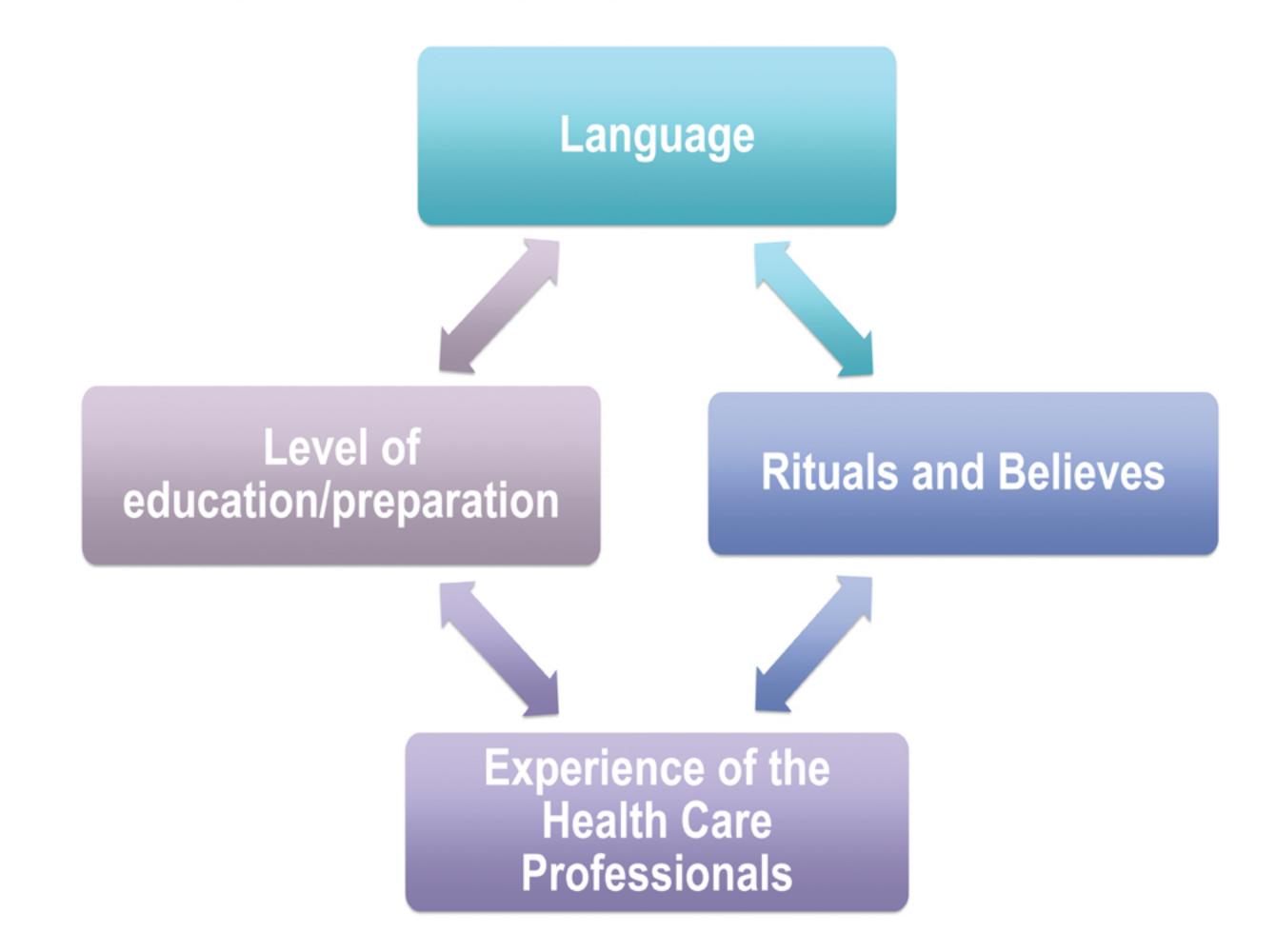
