Abstract Text:

Everyone in academe and clinical settings seems to be discussing the concept of Open Access, but the more information that becomes available, the more questions academics, writers, clinicians, practitioners, and researchers have. Should I participate? Are their benefits? Are their disadvantages? How does intellectual property rights and copyright fit in? What venue is right for me (e.g., journals, websites, repositories)? – By the way, what is a repository and how does it differ from a journal or a database? What is PubMed Central? What rights do I have as an author? Is my work worthy of global dissemination? This session will answer all these questions and more regarding Open Access. There will be a specific focus on dissemination through STTI's free resource, the Virginia Henderson Global Nursing e-Repository (the "Henderson Repository"). Attend this session to learn more about the Henderson Repository and its connection to Open Access dissemination. You may have attended informative sessions regarding the Henderson Repository in the past, but this session will delve deeper into the Open Access movement and the reasons that make this resource a top choice for world-wide recognition for all nurses and nursing students.
